Eucalyptus cerebra	-	narrow leafed ronbark
Eucalyptus curtisii	-	plunkett mallee (small eucalypt)

If you have the room please plant small gum trees, lilly pilly and figs, never plant native plants near barbed wire, plant native palms over exotics, Please note Cocos or queen palms are poisonous and deadly to wildlife so remove them and replant natives.

If you plant natives your garden will come alive with animals, birds and insects.
